Battle Axe

Battle axes generally weigh far less than modern splitting axes, because they were designed to cut legs and arms rather than wood. Consequently, slightly narrow slicing blades are the norm and this would cause deep, devastating wounds. ♀♂

Greek Fire

Greek fire was a sticky flammable liquid used by the eastern Roman Empire. The Byzantines used it in naval battles as it would continue burning while floating on water. ♀♂

Battering Ram

A battering ram was designed to break open walls of fortifications or splinter their wooden gates. Later rams had an arrow-proof, fire-resistant canopy mounted on wheels. Inside the canopy, the log was swung from chains or ropes. ♀♂

Murder Hole

A murder hole is a hole in the ceiling of a passageway in a fortification through which defenders can fire or pour harmful substances such as rocks, arrows, scalding water, hot sand, quicklime, tar, or boiling oil, down on attackers. ♀♂
